





An Interview with Police Chief Daniel Garcia, City of Phoenix

- Q: What does "community" and Canyon Corridor mean to you?
- A: In my eyes, the community and the Canyon Corridor Neighborhood Alliance represent one and the same. This was evident in the recent Community Voices Forum I attended at Grand Canyon University (GCU) on Jan. 11, 2014. Sharing concerns, resources and developing relationships are important steps to keeping our families and our neighborhood safe. Additionally, I am so proud and thankful in witnessing firsthand the successful partnerships that Grand Canyon University has nurtured with the community they serve. An example of this was the Neighborhood Safety Initiative (NSI) that GCU and the City of Phoenix announced aimed at decreasing and preventing crime in the Seville, Cordova, Alhambra and Granada neighborhoods.
- Q: What are your main goals as Chief?
- A: As the Chief of Police for the greatest police department in the country, my goal is to make the City of Phoenix the safest major city in
- Q: What role do you see the police department playing in terms of revitalization efforts in our Canyon Corridor community?
- A: Policing today is a shared responsibility and is the heart of community-based policing. The collective impact of private, public and neighborhood partnerships results in the reduction and prevention of crime. This in return leads to a renewed quality of life for our citizens. Opening lines of communication is necessary for leveraging resources and avoiding duplication of efforts.
- Q: In your recent tour of GCU and the Canyon Corridor community, what stands out the most?
- A: During my recent tour of GCU, I was pleased to see one element that the university possesses that I would want for my children: They belong to a family. I felt that the students attending GCU are considered "family" and that speaks highly of the university staff, students and community. Families take time to develop and nurture. The Phoenix Police Department is fortunate to be a member of this family.
- Q: Additional thoughts?
- A: Bravo to President Brian Mueller and his staff for their continued leadership and for sharing the university's purpose with the community's needs.



#### **NSI UPDATE:**

#### Neighborhood Safety Initiative



The Grand Canyon University Neighborhood Safety Initiative (GCU/NSI) is an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) between the Police Department and Grand Canyon University designed to provide supplemental police services and crime suppression programs to a 4-mile area surrounding the GCU campus. The designated boundaries are: Indian School Road to Bethany Home Road, North 43rd Avenue to Black Canyon Freeway.

Grand Canyon University is providing \$100,000 each year for 5 years for overtime expenditures incurred by the City of Phoenix. The City of Phoenix will match the funds annually. The initiative is the first agreement of its kind between a public agency and private company in Arizona aimed at suppressing crime in a particular neighborhood.

#### **Enforcement programs include:**

1. Programs over the last 6 months have included the Alhambra High School afterschool enforcement, saturation patrols on Camelback, drug complaint enforcement, and bike patrols along 27th Avenue. This has resulted in 6 search warrants, 34 felony arrests, 90 misdemeanor arrests, 312 citations, 244 field interrogations, and 111 departmental reports. 2. Prostitution - Customer Apprehension Programs and routine enforcement have resulted in over 100 prostitution-related arrests and 7 impounded vehicles in the last 7 months. 3. Since inception of the GCU/NSI in August 2012, there have been 250 prostitution arrests, 925 citations, and 447 field interrogations (all in the GCU area). Total arrests are 651.

#### Cactus Park Precinct Update

The Cactus Park Precinct, also known as 900, covers an area from about Indian School Road to Paradise Lane (south of Bell Road), and from about 19th Avenue to 43rd Avenue. It is one of the busiest, if not the busiest precincts in the city by sheer call volume.

One of the common complaints the CAOs (Community Action Officers) have been receiving is in regard to transients. The CAOs are working hard at identifying and arresting those transients who are engaged in criminal behavior, while at the same time attempting to provide social services to those people who are simply in need. The CAOs can be reached at the precinct at 602-495-5009.

The precinct is fully dedicated to community-based policing and understands that by working together with neighborhoods, businesses and schools we can solve problems more effectively. Neighborhoods can assist us by being active participants in their local block watches and by simply being good neighbors to one another.

## A Community's Perspective

"GCU's investment in the NSI grant has greatly improved the safety at our school and within our community.

I have seen this transformation just in the 2 and a half years that I have been here. Parent, teacher and student surveys are now consistently demonstrating this reality. The Phoenix Police Department is now more responsive to our needs than ever before – meeting with me, our parents and neighborhood association groups. Also, I have observed a real effort on their part to work proactively in identifying problem areas near our school and taking measures to work with business owners and residents to problem-solve. They have been especially visible before school and after school – key transition times for 2800 students. This was not the case prior to last year.

On behalf of our parents, students and staff – thank you for investing in our school and in this neighborhood. It's a safer place for everyone."

#### Councilman Danny Valenzuela (District 5):

"I am very proud of the work that has been done and will be done in

the future with the Neighborhood Safety Initiative. By working with the city to create this program, Grand Canyon University has not only made an investment in educating our youth but also in keeping their families safe. I look forward to continuing to work with GCU, the Phoenix Police Department and neighborhood leaders to strengthen the safety of our community."

#### Councilwoman Laura Pastor (District 4):

"The Neighborhood Safety Initiative has had an incredible impact on

the Canyon Corridor. The NSI is a successful example of how a public private partnership can work! The visibility of Police officers through increased patrols and overtime hours reinforces the reality that the Police are here to serve and protect our neighborhoods. Their presence reminds residents to call 9-1-1 or Crime Stop (602-262-6151) to report crime or suspicious activity. Looking forward, I am hopeful that the trend of collaboration between the City, GCU and the community will continue to create positive change to promote growth and community investment while keeping this area safe."



### **CCNA: Bringing** Neighborhoods Together

s time flew by over the months of October through December, the community members and stakeholders of the Canyon Corridor Neighborhood Alliance diligently continued to meet, not only at their monthly meetings, but also at the various sub-committee meetings, crafting their strategic plans of action for their target areas: civic engagement, neighborhood vibrancy, public safety and health.

1st Community Voices Forum (Saturday, May 18, 2013): The first Community Voices Forum was held to plan and launch the creation of the Quality of Life Plan (QLP) for the Canyon Corridor. 2nd Community Voices Forum (Saturday, Jan. 11, 2014): With the dawn of the New Year, a renewed sense of fervor tinged the air. The "Forum" was here. The CCNA hosted its 2nd Community Voices Forum at Grand Canyon University. From the CCNA members to community leaders and stakeholders to diplomats, one and all came to the event to ensure that their voices would be heard and to gather the last input for the QLP for the Canyon Corridor. Near and far, the vast array of representatives showed support for the tremendous work that was being put into the revitalization efforts as well as the development of the QLP for our community. This 2nd Community Voices Forum was designed to gather community comments, critiques, recommendations and support. The subcommittees gathered the information from various community members and representatives as a final way to ensure that everyone had a chance to voice their opinions that would be the defining aspects of the QLP.

3rd Community Voices Forum - QLP Rollout (Saturday, May 17, 2014): The CCNA will present the final draft of the QLP, the living document that describes the past and present, as well as the vision that will shape the future of the Canyon Corridor neighborhood.

Canyon Corridor Business Alliance: In addition to the CCNA and the monumental 2nd Community Voices Forum, the local Canyon Corridor Business Alliance has continued to develop and grow. It is continually striving to achieve the goal of creating economic health in the community and promoting business diversity. #### Canyon Corridor Leadership Academy

#### Alhambra District Thanks You!

Ihambra Elementary School District is proud to provide a quality education and prepare our children for high school, college and their future. In November, the Alhambra School District asked this community to support the district through the passage of a capital override election. This was the first time Alhambra District asked for voter approval for a capital outlay budget override and we are grateful community members showed their continued support of our schools by passing the override.

Alhambra Elementary School District's capital outlay override will generate \$5 million per year and will cost the average homeowner approximately \$65.36 per year; however, the override will not increase the current tax rate. Passage of the capital outlay override will enable Alhambra Elementary School District to pay off a community-approved bond debt in advance. By paying off the bond debt early and replacing it with a lower capital outlay override, there will be no new increase to the tax rate. Alhambra Elementary School District will use this funding in the following ways:

- Classroom Technology Enables the district to purchase computers and up-to-date technologies used in the classroom and to prepare students for college and careers
- Student Transportation -Enables the district to purchase additional school buses to provide safe transportation to and from school
- Renovation of District Facilities
- Enables the district to maintain schools and district facilities, which helps increase property values within the community

We look forward to continuing our tradition of excellence in ensuring a quality education for all of our children!



#### Taking the Jesuit Mission one step further


VERY SUMMER the front lawn of Brophy College Prep is filled with young children and teenage boys all wearing the same colored shirts. For the past 20+ years, Brophy students have led a camp for underserved boys and girls across the Valley that may not have a camp opportunity in their summer plans.

The Loyola Project was founded in response to the needs of students Valley-wide, many of whom Brophy students had tutored in their after school programs during the school year. Admission is free to the campers and transportation, activities and academics are all part of the "camp" experience.

Approximately 180 campers, ages five to ten, attend the summer enrichment camp which is run by Brophy students, "Men for Others" as the school often refers to them. All Jesuit schools across the world have a service component built into their curriculum as the Jesuit philosophy challenges its students to fill gaps in the world's needs with their talents and time.

In summer 2013 the Loyola Project "adopted" 14 refugee children from Serrano Village Apartments. These 14 children, ranging from kindergarten to third grade, were bused to and from Brophy for a month-long summer school program from June 10 to July 3. These 14 students were hand selected by Georgia Sepic, owner and manager of Serrano Village Apartments, with a focus on early elementary schoolaged children. The children were chosen to "...give them the best ever opportunity to form a strong foundation for learning," offered Ms. Sepic.

With the state budget severely depleted, and the Head Start enrollment sporting huge waiting lists, participation in the Loyola Project at Brophy was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for underserved youth to get a boost in their educational experiences as well as a chance to develop some strong role models through the Brophy students who lead the camp and who have reached out to the refugee

classroom on any school day at Alhambra High School and you will witness an outstanding demonstration of teamwork and collaboration. Mr. Mot is the advisor and he has built a strong team. He responded to a call for volunteers to start the program and has found it to be a very humbling and rewarding experience. There are 24 students in the class and each one is motivated and determined to do well. Academic



Decathlon teams throughout Arizona are given 10 different topics to study, with this year's theme being World War I. Students who are proficient in a certain subject area mentor and enrich students who may have a different strength, thereby making themselves a force to be reckoned with in competition. Teachers from specific subject areas also volunteer their time to help the students learn the material.

Under the outstanding tutelage of Mr. Mot, this team has competed successfully throughout the season. They set goals for themselves, one of which was to place in the top three of the regionals. They placed second, so they are now on their way to the state competition. Student Jesus Salinas, who earned a gold medal in Science, says, "It's hard work, but it's worth it." Jesus believes that the speech and interview portion of the class is preparing him well for college, in addition to the course materials. He also feels all students should consider joining Academic Decathlon. Students Juan Solis, gold medalist in math, and Freddy Melara, who earned medals in math, music, speech and social science, also agree that Academic Decathlon is a lot of work. They compare Academic Decathlon to sports, in that Academic Decathlon is "athletics of the mind."

The Academic Decathlon team is just one of the many great things happening at Alhambra High School. We believe in our young people and their capabilities to succeed at high levels. ■

#### **National Board Certification Awards:**

Presented by the National Board for **Professional Teaching Standards**, the National Board Certification (NBC) is considered to be the teaching profession's highest honor and is awarded to teachers who demonstrate, through a professional assessment, that they meet the high and rigorous standards for what accomplished teachers should know and be able to do. Alhambra High School is very proud to announce that two of their teachers achieved this high distinction:

Cynthia Maher teaches writing and grammar to many refugee and immigrant students. She has been with PUHSD since 2006, but has

taught at ASU, American University in Cairo, Egypt and U of A. With the certification, she will never be able to teach again without asking: "Why am I doing it? How will I assess progress? How will I know that the kids have learned it? What will I do if they don't and how will I extend the learning, if they do?" Her grandfather and her father were both educators and Maher says it is in her genes. "The best part of teaching, besides the students, is the fact that there are always ways to improve as a teacher, and it never gets old or stale."



Cristina Yoder is in her second year at Alhambra after 13 years in the Peoria District. Yoder was an art therapist for years and

never wanted to follow in the footsteps of her mother, an English teacher. But after having children, she became a teacher and loves every day of teaching. Yoder wants to be the best teacher for her students and she says the NBC process really helps refine her craft. She enjoys teaching her students how to draw and paint and see them realize that they are capable of amazing things. Born in Cuba, Yoder attended college in Indiana and Kentucky before coming



#### GCU Learning Lounge tutoring to expand

T WAS CONCEIVED as an opportunity to give underperforming students at a neighboring public high school free, individualized math and English homework help in a safe environment where they also could grab a bag of Teddy Grahams and watch a little television after studying. But in just four months, the Grand Canyon University Learning Lounge has evolved into an experience for more than 150 Alhambra High students, some who have now passed Arizona's high school graduation test and are contemplating their careers.

"Last fall, these Alhambra students were worried about graduating from high school," said Dr. Joe Veres, GCU's director of K-12 outreach, of which the Learning Lounge is the crown jewel. "Now, they're getting college life experience, building relationships with our 30 tutors and thinking about going to college."

The Learning Lounge was launched last September. It was envisioned by Brian Mueller, GCU's CEO and president, and championed by the Phoenix Union High School District and Alhambra's principal, Claudio Coria, and its teachers and staff. Word spread quickly at Alhambra that the Lounge, a chill place that handed out free T-shirts and mugs, was open from 3 to 8 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

#### **Passing the AIMS**

Alhambra seniors Sarahi Chavez and Isaul Rodriguez were among those who showed up early and often. As a result of working several days a week with tutor Leslie Pace, each passed the writing portion of the AIMS test. Chavez graduated in December, and Rodriguez has straight A's and is on track to graduate in May. Both students are Mexican immigrants who only learned English within the past few years.

"We just went slowly, and we were able to spend a lot of time together," said Pace, a freshman majoring in web design. "They were willing to work, and they had a lot of discipline."

Chavez, who was born in Mexico and came to the United States at age 15, had tried to pass the test four times previously. She said Pace was a great teacher who not only improved her writing skills, but also her confidence. Chavez said she did it for her brother, 12-year-old Isaac, and plans to don her cap and gown and walk in Alhambra's May graduation ceremony for him, too.

"I want him to see that if I can do it, he can do it also," said Chavez, who hopes to go to college and become a family therapist.

Chavez, Rodriguez and four other Alhambra students passed the AIMS test last semester. The tutors worked with nearly 175 students, about six percent of the school's population, and provided 139 days – 835 hours – of extra instructional time during the Lounge's first 60 days.

"Our priorities are still to increase math and English scores of ninth graders, where we can have the most impact, to build their confidence and support our partner schools," Veres said. "But we are also seeing other needs, the junior or senior who says, 'Hey, I need help.' We don't turn anyone away."

#### Making way for more students

Students at Bourgade Catholic High, a GCU educational partner about a mile south of campus, also were invited to the Lounge last semester. The school plans to use it more this spring, said Assistant Principal Vicki Kilgarriff.



In November, the Lounge and its overstuffed chairs and couches, stacks of books and CDs, study tables and computers were relocated to Building 9 on campus. With the move came the start of daily deliveries by St. Mary's Food Bank of nutritious meals for the students, an arrangement suggested by September Lopez, a GCU graduate student in professional counseling.

Currently, St. Mary's delivers each week about 100 meals, which have a variety of offerings from the five food groups. The quantity will expand with student demand this spring.

Having seen and heard what has been accomplished at Alhambra, Maryvale is all in. At a time when public school funding is tight, the school, which is about four miles southwest of GCU, has found money to pay for two buses to bring up to 110 juniors and seniors to the Lounge, initially once a week. Tutors also will travel weekly to Faith Christian School, another GCU educational partner.

To handle the influx of new students, GCU is hiring up to 20 additional tutors, noting that none of the original 30 tutors hired last semester has quit.

Veres said he is amazed that, with TV, food and games as potential distractions, the students are usually focused on one thing. "These kids want to spend a majority of their time face-to-face with the tutors," he said.

He credits the tutors with making the program successful. "Our students made this what it is," he said. "It's 'Find Your Purpose' in action."

Shortly before Christmas break, Chavez and Rodriguez dropped by the Lounge to tell Pace they had passed the AIMS and to give her a candy bar in gratitude. They said they probably wouldn't be back.

"I do miss them," Pace said. "It's cool to be able to encourage someone that they can get through high school, they can make good grades and, one day, go to college if they want to. It feels good to have helped change someone's life like that."

O YOU RECALL a time when you sat at your desk confounded by a situation, wishing for a network of like-minded individuals to help guide you to a solution? Now, envision such a place.

Jumpstart is that vision come true! Located at 37th Avenue and Thomas Road, Jumpstart is strategically placed at the cross section of Maryvale Village and Canyon Corridor.

**The Vision:** To provide a collective space and resources that support local businesses in West Phoenix in achieving growth through development of sustainable processes and procedures.

**The Mission:** To strengthen and empower the local community, pursued through increasing the viability and capacity of local businesses. Achieving this goal will result in job retention and creation through intentional, calculated efforts and nurturing local business owners. Methods include one-on-one training, education and technical assistance and consulting through the leveraging of current existing resources.

Stellar Corp initiated Jumpstart to provide an affordable, all-inclusive office setting that breaks down barriers of "silo operations" and encourages inter-connectedness by leveraging the collaborative energy of business owners. Currently, Sam Macias, a business management senior in GCU's Ken Blanchard College of Business, is

working in partnership with Stellar Corp in pushing Jumpstart to be a stimulant for economic development in west Phoenix.

Looking at the economy of the west side, affordability was a key component in the development of the prices for businesses. "Daily Driver" membership starts at \$55 for monthly space in the collaborative space called the Parking Lot. "Designated Driver" members receive dedicated desk/workstations in a shared suite. A full "Diesel Driver" membership is \$200 - \$300/month. All members receive building access, workshops and Wifi. Conference rooms are included in the Designated and Diesel Driver memberships, but are also available for individual rates. There is also a \$15/day Drive-Thru membership if individuals want to "test drive" Jumpstart space.

Supporting community partners include Maryvale Revitalization Corporation, KJZZ, Rio Salado – Thomas, Washington School Elementary School District Business Alliance, Grand Canyon University, Business Alliance of Canyon Corridor, Co-Hoots Coworking and AZ Small Business Development Center.
